The final document of the Synod of the Universal Church, centred on the theme of synodality, actually devotes only two numbers to the family (No. 35 and No. 64), but one would be mistaken to think that the family was forgotten or underestimated by the Synodal Assembly. On the contrary, it was seen as the paradigm for learning concretely what it means to be a synodal church, a church that gathers, listens, discerns and decides together.

Synod and family. Towards a family church

In this regard, the most forceful text of the document is no. 35. *"Families, which the Council refers to as 'as it were, the domestic Church' (LG 11), are the pre-eminent context in which we learn to live out the richness of relationships between persons, united in their diversity of character, sex, age and role. In families, we learn to experience the basic practices needed for a synodal Church. The reality of brokenness and suffering experienced by families notwithstanding, they remain places where we learn to exchange the gifts of love, trust, reconciliation, forgiveness and understanding. Here, we learn that we are equal in dignity and created for reci-*

procity, that we need to be listened to, and that we are able to listen. Here we first learn how to discern and decide together, accept and exercise authority that is loving and life-giving, and to be co-responsible and accountable".

These words call for a reversal of perspective. We are used to thinking that the family is an 'object' of pastoral care. This is true, but the opposite, according to the Synod, is even more true. The Synod fathers and mothers fully embraced the perspective that Pope Francis gave in his Exhortation *Amoris laetitia*. In it he calls for a reconsideration of ecclesial identity beginning with the family. Pope Francis, while acknowledging and integrating the Church's traditional path to the family, proposes a reverse approach: starting from the experience of love lived in the family to enlighten the Church as the 'family of God's children'. In this perspective, it is not only families that define themselves as Church, but it is the Church itself that conceives itself as family, situating itself in the school of family life.

The family, from a place often interpreted as a source of problems or an object of moral regulation, is instead revealed as a fundamental resource: a community of love and life which becomes an essential source for the very constitution of the Church. In this context, the family is not only an 'object' of pastoral attention, but a fundamental 'subject' for making the whole Church and its pastoral mission 'family-oriented'. It is configured as a 'theological place', from which the very mystery of the Church can be understood more deeply.

The family, with all its frailties, remains the richest school of humanity and life.

It is an 'existential', a fundamental formative reality for understanding and realising personal, social and ecclesial existence. The family is the 'matrix of identity', the basis of relationships and social life, because each person is what the family has allowed him to be and what he can become in the world.

A Church that wants to be 'synodal' is called to become a 'family Church'.

Being a family today

The concept of family throughout Salvation History has changed and will continue to change. From Abraham who unites with his slave girl to have offspring, to Brother Gabriel who does not leave Belleydoux (1824) until he has the blessing of his parents, passing through the extended family in Nazareth where cousins are included (Mk 6:3), up to today where so many single-parent families struggle to be 'one heart and one soul' loving and helping each other, sharing joys, sorrows, successes and failures... (Cf. Circular 21 of Brother Gabriel).

"The Holy Family shows us the bonds which united them and which led them to care and concern for each other: 'Your father and I looked for you in anguish' (Lk 2:48). In faith, we see in the family union of Jesus, Mary and Joseph an inspiring ideal of fullness, balance, development and true love... every experience of family relationships can be inspired by the union of the family of Nazareth, because all love carries within it something of the paternity, maternity and filiation of God. Respect for the mystery of love that we find in every expression of family life is an impulse to encourage every family that frequents the centres of the Sa-Fa Family to be inspired by the Holy Family of Nazareth as a desirable and accessible ideal" (Laity under the same roof of Nazareth. 2023).

But there is still more to guide us in the answer to the initial question *"Then his mother and his brothers came and, standing outside, sent for him. The crowd was sitting around Jesus, and they said to him, 'Your mother and your brothers are looking for you outside'. And he said to them, 'Who is my mother and who are my brothers?' And looking at those sitting around him, he said, 'These are my mother and my brothers. For whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother'" (Mk 3:31-35).*



We believe that there is a common element in all the types of family we have hinted at and those to come: to do God's will, to seek it, to recognise it and to do it. It is what we pray every day, in that prayer of the family which is the Our Father... *'hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven...'*

Those who live together, sharing their daily bread, forgiving offences and taking care not to deviate from God's will, those will be a family in the context of our spirituality. Thank you for reflecting on this with me!
