Being a Sa-Fa educator today

Educators who live their profession with passion: Sa-Fa Educators live their vocation in the School, nourishing the deepest motivations of their being educators and guiding and helping students to find their own vocation. They value the complementarity of vocations (religious and laypeople) present in the school and understand educational work as a vocation of service. They carry out their mission with "educational passion" and know that "To raise the child to where one is, one must descend to where he is" (Br. Gabriel. Introduction to French Grammar. Sa-Fa Schools for the World, 17))

Educators learning and updating: The Sa-Fa Educator is willing to learn and update himself/herself on a permanent basis. This attitude allows him/her to empathise with the students and to collaborate in learning. He/she is aware that education is an interaction and thus each educator educates others and at the same time is educated by those he/she educates. He/she adopts a positive disposition to change and to discover and experiment with methods that provide creative and adapted responses to the diverse and changing situations of learners. Letter of Bro. Gabriel to an educator of today

This text is a literary fiction. It has been written imagining that Br Gabriel is replying to a letter addressed to him by an educator of the Sa-Fa Family on the meaning and importance of education today. The only point of contact with reality is that at the end of July last year in Sigüenza, a group of Brothers and lay people each wrote a letter to Brother Gabriel and placed it in the hole where a lime tree had been planted. Is this the answer to that letter?

Dear educator of the Sa-Fa Family:

I am replying to your letter today because I understand the concern and interest that you educators have today to carry out your mission in a society that proposes many immediate solutions to children and young people but without giving them the time and the means to grow and mature serenely.


From a very young age, I noticed around me two serious problems through which I perceived an inner call that asked me for a commitment to orient my life: the destruction of the churches caused by the revolution and the abandonment of children in towns and cities, deprived of the possibility of being educated for lack of teachers and means.

In founding the Congregation of the Brothers of the Holy Family, I wanted to do my bit by helping parishes to look after places of worship and to give children and young people a good education based on Gospel values.

For me "to educate a child is, in general terms, to develop, strengthen and perfect the organs of his body and the faculties of his spirit and, above all, to educate his heart, his will, his character, his conscience and his judgement".

It is not only the transmission of teaching and learning techniques that must be taken into account, but also the communication of values. "Instruction alone is not enough to form an honest man, a citizen and a true Christian. To all this must be added education, that is to say, he must be taught to direct his conscience and his habits, and at the same time he must be given light and strength, which will help him powerfully to fulfil his duties towards God, towards himself and towards his fellow men".

It seemed to me important in my time to adopt the most balanced and up-to-date methods of the time, combining collective, group or individual teaching according to the case, and for this purpose I wrote some books with indications and advice for schools...



A lot has happened since then. The landscape of education and society has changed a lot. In the context in which you work today as an educator, you find political-economic systems structured according to the market, which reduce the dignity of the human person and accentuate inequality. There are many people without hope. New technologies allow people to communicate much more with each other, but the messages they convey do not always promote people's growth. The balance between the values of globalisation and the cultivation of the identity of diverse cultures is increasingly difficult to strike...

Your task is crucial at this time. Education alone cannot change society, but no major transformation can take place without educational intervention.

That is why I want to conclude by encouraging you to continue your educational task carried out in collaboration with your companions, in "family spirit", and with confidence in a better future and more open to universal fraternity.


